Hope Rising is Hiring


Hope Rising, a residential program serving female survivors of trafficking, is hiring for fulltime Residential Staff. See the full posting for this position <u>here</u>.

Trafficking Prevention Program Increases in Maine

In collaboration with Maine STEN and local anti-trafficking teams statewide, <u>My Life My</u> <u>Choice</u> came to Maine to train 34 new facilitators in its sex trafficking prevention curriculum. Teams of facilitators are able to provide the 10-week psycho-educational group in their communities. The program is designed to reduce risk factors for femaleidentified teens and foster healthy relationship and communication skills.
